

SNAPSHOT OF THE RoSA

The Record of School Achievement (RoSA) is a new credential for NSW school students.

Previously, students who did not go on to receive their HSC used their School Certificate as a record of their secondary school achievements. However, the School Certificate was primarily a record of their performance at the end of Year 10. It did not give recognition for achievement if that student had continued on to complete courses in Year 11 or 12.

The RoSA records grades or participation in courses right up to the students leaving school, giving them a more comprehensive and meaningful record of their academic achievements. Those grades are allocated by teachers, and monitored by the Board, to ensure that students receive fair and consistent recognition for their work.

For those students who leave school prior to receiving their HSC, the RoSA will become the school credential they will use when applying for employment for further education or training.

The RoSA testamur (the formal documentation provided to students who leave school before completing their HSC) is one part of the RoSA package available to students. Other RoSA components include:

- access for all students from Year 10 onwards to a transcript of all current grades through the Board's Students Online website
- a record of all grades achieved in senior secondary school years for all students, including those who receive their HSC
- access to online literacy and numeracy tests for those students who leave school before receiving their HSC (online literacy and numeracy tests are being piloted in 2012)
- access to an online service allowing all students to consolidate a record of their extracurricular achievements (this service is being piloted with a small number of schools in 2012).

ROLL CALL 2013

Erina High School has made changes to the curriculum to ensure the school runs smoothly, attendance is accurately monitored and students are better organised and more engaged in their learning.

Bell times have been adjusted to allow for a roll call period in the morning. The school is negotiating with the bus companies.

Roll call periods will be used to check attendance, remind students when notes need to be returned, check uniform, provide daily announcements and allow Year Advisors and Head Teachers to catch up with individual students.

Students will be placed in roll classes in alphabetical year groups and the rolls will be marked in home rooms. A new roll marking program has been purchased to allow rolls to be marked electronically and student attendance tracked each lesson.

NO KNIVES AT SCHOOL

There's no good reason to bring a knife to school.

NSW now has the toughest knife laws in Australia. As a parent, you need to be aware of these laws, as you can also be charged if you allow your child to carry a knife.

No knives allowed at school under any circumstances.

- If a student has a knife at school the principal may call the police.
- The student may be expelled or suspended immediately. Possessing a knife includes your child simply having one in their bag or locker. Having a knife for self-protection is also illegal. If you are concerned about your child's wellbeing or safety, contact the principal.
- Tough penalties apply for children convicted of knife offences, including jail sentences of up to 25 years if someone is injured with a knife during an assault.

What kind of knives are prohibited?

School policy is designed to keep all students safe, and so no type of knife is allowed at school. That means no butter knives or fruit knives in lunchboxes, or knife tools for craft purposes.

- Flick knives, ballistic knives, sheath knives, push daggers, trench knives, butterfly knives, star knives are all prohibited.
- Your child cannot bring to school any item that can be used as a weapon (such as a chisel).
- In lessons requiring the use of knives, for example cooking or trades, your child's teacher will supply and supervise the use of the tools.
- There are some senior subjects, such as hospitality, where children may be required to have their own knives. Your child's school will advise you about these courses and the procedures for carrying knives legally to and from school and TAFE.

The law makes parents responsible

You need to make certain your child is aware of the school's rules and the State laws about knives.

If you allow your child to carry or possess a knife at school or in a public place, you can be charged.

- The police can search any child they suspect of having a knife.
 They can confiscate any dangerous object they might find during the search.
- Your child must comply with such a police search, or they may be arrested and charged.
- It is also illegal for anyone to sell a knife to anyone who is less than 16 years old.

Every child has the right to feel safe and secure at school. There is no good reason for them to ever have a knife at school.

If you want to talk about children and knives at school, please contact the principal.




